This is an important year for Derry. It is highly likely that the report from the Bloody Sunday Inquiry will be made public at some stage in 2010. It is even possible its release may occur prior to Easter. The families of those killed on Bloody Sunday, those who were physically wounded, as well as the general populace of Derry have waited and campaigned for almost 40 years to hear the truth being uttered and accepted as such by a British Government. This side of the report being made public there are many concerns and anxieties shared among the families and others as to the report's content and implications. On Friday evening 29th January, two family representatives, Tony Doherty and John Kelly, along with Bloody Sunday Trust members Eamonn McCann and Christine Bell, will discuss a range of important issues relative to these concerns regarding the release and content of the report.

Irish Premiere of previously lost 1962 film by Jacques Panijel. On 17 October 1961, Algeria's National Liberation Front, the FLN, defied France's Emergency Powers Act and called tens of thousands of Algerian immigrant workers onto the streets of Paris, to take part in a peaceful demonstration calling for recognition of Algeria's right to self-determination. French police attacked marchers with indiscriminate brutality. As the day progressed, tens of thousands were rounded up and interned. Following the round-up in October 1961, Papon gave police license to torture and kill Algerian internees. Over the next days, hundreds were tortured and killed in the sports stadia and police stations. The exact number of killed is unknown, though credible estimates put the figure at 200+.
